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HAIR MAPPING BODY; BODY MAPPING LAND



ICD BROOKFIELD PLACE

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Cartography is the science or practice of drawing maps. Mapping is a symbolic depiction associating elements to space. The intersection of the body as elemental and land as spatial, becomes the first two coordinates defined cartographically. These coordinates become a mode of navigation through the exploration of land and sky, fluid and solid, private and public. The map proposed in this exhibition decodes and reintroduces land through the body, and the body through land.

Afra Al Dhaheri's *Fil Al Shaar,* drapes into ridges that peak and fall, reminiscent of mountains or waves adrift. Behind the ropes of Fil Al Shaar is a segmented space, reflective of a mountain range governing over a pocket town. A contrast of works, between Fil Al Shaar and Cultural Foundation in its height and might stands tall, taller than the mountain range proposed through the silhouette of the draping ropes. It stands in its essence as a source of attendance, overlooking and watching what's beneath it. Tucked away, Mohamed Ahmed Ibrahim's Khorfakkan allows a scatter to take place, with the horizontality proposed, a flattened perspective is introduced in contrast to the height, resembling a pocket town, at the core of a valley. The land and the sky are introduced as complementary elements to one another. The clustered sculptures reflect ripple effects, manicured gardens, and orienting constellations. Pulling from the nature that surrounds him, Mohamed Ahmed Ibrahim's work roots itself in

response to movement and play. His geographical understanding of KhorFakkan mimics the rocky mountainscapes, which are a reflection of his attempts at exploring, expanding and decoding the self. Afra Al Dhaheri's practice utilises the body as its anchor, in specifically hair. It looks at hair as a tree, rooting in, extending out and introducing the notion of what is deemed private versus public. Hair becomes a tool that decodes the stories of time and the changes it brings. Thus binding these intergenerational artistic practices in the remapping of their surroundings in relation to the self, and the self in relation to these surroundings.

The drawing of this map ebbs and flows between body to nature and nature to body. Repetitive rituals negotiate the cardinal directions of the separation and movement that dictate the understanding of one's positionality. The conversation between the body and the land becomes the barrier and the bridge of the prism dividing, scattering and bending time in relation to the self. Here a compass is proposed, and is pegged to the landscape imagined in the map presented.

As part of the exhibition's public programming, UAE-based artist Mohamed Khalid responds to this show, proposing an alternative way of mapping space and distance. Over the course of this exhibition, he creates an ephemeral art piece in response to the works of Afra Al Dhaheri and Mohamed Ahmed Ibrahim.

MUNIRA AL SAYEGH



Munira Al Sayegh is an independent curator and a cultural instigator based in Abu Dhabi, United Arab Emirates.

Actively pursuing grassroots incubation, Al Sayegh is the founder of Dirwaza Curatorial Lab, Abu Dhabi's first curatorial incubator and projects partner. She is also co- founder of Engage101, a collecting and research platform. She is a published author and prominent voice in the region discussing the importance of non-institutional thinking to build regional art movements from the bottom-up.

Al Sayegh curated and developed the program series for the Guggenheim Abu Dhabi's The Creative Act: Performance, Process, Presence (2017). In parallel, from 2014 she has joined and pioneered curatorial initiatives across Art Dubai where she curated the Residents section (2019) and started the Now series, looking at non-government funded creative platforms in the region. She recently served as lead tutor and curator for Campus Art Dubai.

Her curatorial solo debut was Bayn: the in-between (2017), the third edition of UAE Unlimited. Later, she curated the Talks Program in Abu Dhabi Art. In 2020, Al Sayegh premiered The Cup and The Saucer commissioned by Warehouse421 (Sheikha Salama bint Hamdan Foundation), where she has also led in-house public programs.

Among her contributions, she traces back to NYU Abu Dhabi's FIND project (2012) and currently sits on the advisory board for the university's art gallery. Al Sayegh is also part of the UAE Ministry of Culture Visual Arts Committee as well as Dubai Collection's Steering and Curatorial Committee.

AFRA AL DHAHERI



Afra Al Dhaheri's work is rooted in her experiences growing up in Abu Dhabi and the wider UAE – a place of recent and rapid change. Working across various mediums including mixed media, sculpture, drawing, painting, installation, photography, and printmaking, she draws out notions of time and adaptation, rigour and fragility.

With each experiment, there is a new phase, each new phenomenon or actualisation plucked from her unique vocabulary of references – repetition acts as a method for prolonging time as much as a tool through which to truly experience or realise each stage of a work.

Born in 1988 in Abu Dhabi, UAE, Al Dhaheri obtained her MFA from Rhode Island School of Design, USA in 2017 and had her residencies from The Salama bint Hamdan Emerging Artists Fellowship, in partnership with the Rhode Island School of Design in 2014 and Porthmeor Studios, St. Ives, Cornwall, UK (2019).

Solo exhibitions include Split Ends, Green Art Gallery, Dubai, UAE (2021) and Inevitable Ephemera, T + H Gallery, Boston, USA (2016). 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MOHAMED AHMED IBRAHIM



Mohamed Ahmed Ibrahim came of age as an artist in the UAE in an era in which the visual arts were not yet valued culturally or taught in university degree programmes. In 1986, when he met the late artist Hassan Sharif (a founding member of the influential Emirates Fine Art Society), Ibrahim was pulled out of a secluded practice and carved out unshakable friendships and collaborations that have formed the foundation for the creative community that defines the UAE today.

In March 2018 *Elements*, a survey of works spanning three decades of his practice, was presented at the Sharjah Art Foundation, curated by Sheikha Hoor Al Qasimi. Ibrahim's recent solo exhibitions include *Dusk Till Dawn*, Cromwell Place, London with Lawrie Shabibi (2021), *Memory Drum* (2020) and *The Space between the Eyelid and the Eyeball* (2019) at Lawrie Shabibi, Dubai, as well as a series of solo shows at Cuadro Gallery, Dubai (2018, 2016, 2015, 2013).

Ibrahim's public works include: Hugs (2020), Sustainability Pavilion, Expo 2020, Dubai, UAE, commissioned by Expo 2020; Falling Stones Garden (2020), Al Ula, Saudi Arabia, commissioned by the Royal Commission for Al Ula and Desert X; Grocery (2019), Madinat Zayed Market, Abu Dhabi, UAE, commissioned by Ghadan 21, Government of Abu Dhabi as part of the For Abu Dhabi initiative; Untitled (2019), Reem Central Park, Al Reem Island, Abu Dhabi, UAE, commissioned by Aldar Properties PJSC in partnership with Abu Dhabi Art: Kids' Garden (2019), Sheikh Khalifa Medical City, Abu Dhabi, UAE, commissioned by Abu Dhabi Health Services Company; and Bait Al Hurma (2018), Al Mureijah Square, Sharjah, commissioned by the Sharjah Art Foundation as part of the exhibition Elements.

Ibrahim's group exhibitions include participations

in *But We Cannot See Them: Tracing a UAE Art Community, 1988-2008* at The NYUAD Art Gallery (2017); *The Unbearable Lightness of Being*, Yay Gallery, Baku (2015); the Kochi-Muziris Biennale, Kochi (2016); the 53rd Venice Biennale, Venice (2009); the Sharjah Biennial (1993, 2003 and 2007); and the Dhaka Biennial (2002 and 1993). Select institutional exhibitions include the Kunstmuseum, Bonn (2005); the Sharjah Art Museum, Sharjah (2005 and 1996), the Ludwig Forum for International Art, Aachen (2002); Institut du Monde Arabe, Paris (1998); Sittard Art Centre, the Netherlands (1995), and the Exhibition for the Emirates Fine Art Society in the Soviet Union, Moscow (1990).

He received the first prize for sculpture at the Sharjah Biennial in 1999 and 2001 and has been a member of the Emirates Fine Arts Society since 1986, founding Art Atelier at the Khor Fakkan Art Centre in 1997. He has participated in artist residencies at Trans Indian Ocean Artist Exchange, Kochi Murzi Biennale, India (2016); A.i.R Dubai (2015); Le Consortium, Dijon, France (2009) and Kunstcentrum Sittard, the Netherlands (1994-1996, 1998-2000).

His works have been acquired by significant international collections, including Sharjah Art Foundation, Sharjah; Sharjah Art Museum, Sharjah; Guggenheim Abu Dhabi, Art Jameel Collection, Dubai; Barjeel Art Foundation, Sharjah; Mathaf: Arab Museum of Modern Art, Doha; Kunstcentrum Sittard, Sittard; The British Museum, London; and Le Centre Georges Pompidou, Paris.

In 2022 Mohamed Ahmed Ibrahim will present a solo exhibition at the National Pavilion of the UAE at the 59th Venice Biennale, where he will represent the UAE.

Ibrahim works and lives in Khorfakkan, United Arab Emirates.
